Mr. Scott has four children including Matthew '94.

*Mayo Shattuck III '76* Mayo Shattuck III is a Vice Chairman of Bankers Trust New York Corporation and is Co-Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer of its BT Alex. Brown Incorporated. Mr. Shattuck was President and Chief Operating Officer of Alex. Brown Incorporated before its merger with Bankers Trust and prior to that he was co-head of the Corporate Finance Division working with the Firm's San Francisco Office. He also served as Head of the Technology Group at a time when Alex. Brown brought public companies such as Sun Microsystems, Microsoft, Octel, Oracle and Silicon Graphics. In Baltimore, Mr. Shattuck is the Chairman of the Board of the Columbus Center, a \$160 million marine biotechnology project in Baltimore's Inner Harbor. He also serves on the board of the Bryn Mawr School, The Wellness Community, the President's Advisory Board of UMAB and UMBC and is a cabinet member for The United Way of Central Maryland. Mr. Shattuck received his M.B.A. from Stanford University. Mr. Shattuck has two children, Mayo IV and Katie.

Mr. Fogg has been a member of Skadden, Arps's Policy Committee, the Firm's principal governing body, for many years. A stimulating evening of jazz past and present, tonight's concert will be sizzling; reserve early and avoid being shut out of a no doubt sell-out show. #### II: Williams Reunion Jazz Band

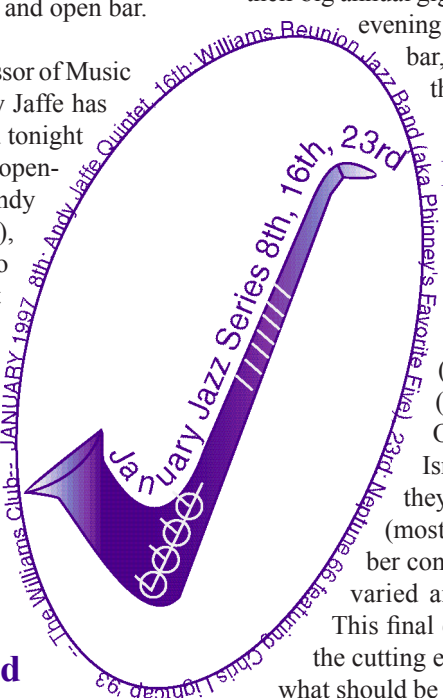
#### III: Neptune 66

Professor Sheppard graduated from Amherst College in 1991 and earned his Ph.D. from Princeton in 1996. ## DIRECT FROM CAMPUS

### Professor Craig Wilder, "That Peculiar Urbanization: Slavery in Colonial New York City"

January, 20th at 6:30 PM

Cocktail reception to be followed by lecture at 7:00 PM.

One of the most dynamic new professors teaching at Williams, Craig Wilder has based his career on his innovative research and study of New York City history.

Professor Wilder will speak on the nature and conditions of race relations in colonial New York City. He writes, "From 1626 to the end of the American Revolution, the collection of villages and towns that formed Dutch New Amsterdam and British New York exhibited a striking dependence upon the labor of unfree people. Through the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, New York County and neighboring Kings County (today's Brooklyn) experienced dramatic increases in the populations of enslaved Africans. By 1776 both areas were peculiar, for they exhibited a dependence upon unfree labor that classed them with Southern cities. By exploring the career of bondage in the Metropolis, this lecture offers a re-examination of the history of Colonial New York.

Known to his colleagues and students online as "Citykid," this Bedford-Stuyvesant native now resides in the lush countryside of Williamstown encouraging his students to "do history." His involvement with museums and cultural centers is very important to his work; as he says, "Very few people are ever going to read my dissertation, no matter how long it sits on Columbia University's shelves. Thousands of people are going to pass through museums every year and see our projects." He currently acts as a consultant to The New York State Museum, The Brooklyn Children's Museum, The Society for the Preservation of Weeksville and Bedford-Stuyvesant History, and the Chicago Historical Society. Before coming to Williams, Wilder chaired the Urban Studies department at Long Island University from 1990-1995. He received his B.A. from Fordham University in 1987 and a Ph.D. in history from Columbia University in 1994. His doctoral dissertation was the basis for his upcoming

book, *A Covenant with Color*, about race relations in Brooklyn.

## Dr. Roscoe C. Brown, Jr.,

### “Tuskegee Airmen Highlights”

February 4th, 6:00 PM

Dr. Roscoe Brown served as Squadron Commander of the 100th Fighter Squadron of the 332nd fighter group—the famed Tuskegee Airmen—leaving military service in 1945 with the rank of Captain. He completed 68 combat missions flying the P-51 Mustang, escorting B-24 and B-17 bombers over Germany, Austria and the Balkans. The highlight of Dr. Brown's career occurred when he became the first 15th Air Force pilot to shoot down the ME-262 jet fighter on the 15th Air Force's longest mission. This mission led to the group's receiving the Presidential Unit Citation, the highest honor bestowed upon a combat unit. For his achievements, Dr. Brown was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with eight Oak Leaf Clusters.

Dr. Brown later earned a Ph.D. from NYU, and has pursued a career in education as Professor, founding Director of the Institute for Afro-American Affairs at NYU, President of Bronx Community College, and most recently as Director of the Center for Urban Education Policy at the Graduate School and University Center of the City University of NY.
