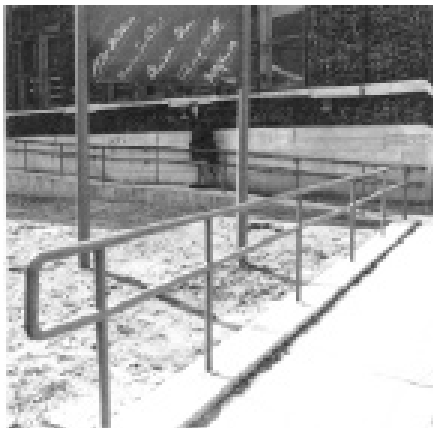
## LECTURES

### Tony Smith '57 "GreenBranches Growing" President and CEO, Horticultural Society of New York

Since Tony Smith became President and CEO of the 97 year old Horticultural Society of New York, best known for the annual New York Flower Show, it has taken on a number of impressive, ambitious and so far very successful public, community-oriented projects. Tonight, Mr. Smith will give a lecture and slide presentation about the most far-reaching

of the new projects, GreenBranches. The GreenBranches program works with community volunteers to design and install gardens around Carnegie Branch libraries in the five boroughs. Currently, there is one in the ground (*before* and *after* pictures featured at right and above) and 8 more funded for design and installation this year. The program involves three library systems, all the botanical gardens, the Department of Correction and the Board of Education. The program is a living testament to the Society's mission of "improving the quality of life in New York by stimulating the knowledge and love of horticulture through education, community outreach programs and library services."



Mr. Smith graduated from Williams with a B.A. in Political Science in 1957 and has had a varied and fascinating career path since then, including time spent on active duty with the U.S. Air Force (1957-1960), as an operations officer with the CIA (1960-1972), and at work in a number of New York City offices including the Mayor's Office, the NYPD, the Board of Education, and also the MTA as Chief Administrative Officer. ### Professor Laurie Heatherington "Presenting Oneself to Others: Gender Matters"

From classrooms to boardrooms, in formal and in informal settings, whether we like it or not, we are constantly presenting ourselves to others. In psychology research studies, and in everyday life, the observation that gender matters in self-presentation has been confirmed and analyzed in numerous interesting ways. Specifically, girls and women, relative to boys and men, tend to underestimate and undervalue their performances and abilities. Under what conditions do they do this, and why? Professor Heatherington will discuss her research and related other research on this topic, raising for thought the questions, "why should we care?" and "what, if anything, should we do about it?"

Professor Heatherington earned her Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology at the University of Connecticut in 1981 and has been teaching at Williams since 1984. Her class on Psychological Disorders and her seminar on Clinical and Community Psychology are favorites among psychology majors and non-majors alike. Heatherington's research interests include family therapy process-outcome, and gender and social interaction. She has published numerous articles (often co-authored with Williams students) and book chapters; in addition, she sits on the editorial boards of a number of journals including *Psychotherapy Research*, *Journal of Marital and Family Therapy*, and *Journal of Family Psychology*.

St. John's Lodge No. 1 has the bible on which Justice Stanley Livingston swore in President George Washington.

## PROGRAM

### EUGENE J. JOHNSON '59

#### "CONTEMPORARY MUSEUM ARCHITECTURE:

#### FRANK GEHRY'S GUGGENHEIM BILBAO"

The museum has become one of the most interesting and important building types of the late 20th century. Two major examples have opened this past fall: the Getty Center in Los Angeles and the Guggenheim in Bilbao. The former has not enjoyed anything like unanimous critical acclaim, whereas the latter was pronounced, even before it opened, a "miracle." Does it deserve such praise? Fresh from seeing the building, and armed with his own slides thereof, Professor Johnson will try to answer this question.

### WILLIAM PIERSON

#### "THOMAS EAKINS AND WALT WHITMAN AND

#### THEIR QUEST FOR THE HUMAN SPIRIT"

This talk will be an examination of several aspects of the late nineteenth century American culture as revealed in a comparative

study of two creative giants of the period, the painter Thomas Eakins and the poet Walt Whitman. Eakins painted Whitman's portrait in 1887, an event which marked the beginning of a fascinating friendship that lasted until the poet's death in 1892. Although the two men were in many ways radically different, they were at the same time powerful individuals with shared beliefs that were fundamental to their creativity. It is these areas of common vision that Professor Pierson will explore in specific examples of their work.

### WHITNEY STODDARD '35

#### "SCULPTURE AND GLASS AT THE CHARTES CATHEDRAL"

The counterpart to Professor Stoddard's lecture on the Architecture of Chartes, this talk will cover the sculpture of the early and high gothic portals and transept; the west portals from the 1140's and the portals of the 1200's. The star of the show, however, will be the glasswork. Professor Stoddard will speak about the west windows, contemporary with the west portals, and the windows of the high gothic cathedral. A number of newly acquired slides of the stained glass will be used for the presentation.

### GLENN LOWRY '76

#### "MOMA AND THE FUTURE:

#### BUILDING THE NEW MUSEUM OF MODERN ART"

During the past year, no other project has so seized the attention of the international world of architecture and design as the announced expansion and rebuilding of The Museum of Modern Art. In this lecture, Mr. Lowry, Director of the Modern, will examine the philosophical and architectural issues that face the Museum as it enters upon a ten-year program that will combine new building and renovation of already existing spaces. A champion of innovative architecture since 1929, the Museum is determined that its new incarnation will be an architectural landmark for the twenty-first century.

### CAROL OCKMAN

#### "LESSONS FROM THE DIVA: SARAH BERNHARDT AND

#### MASS CULTURE"

Those of us who remember Sarah Bernhardt think of her primarily as a great tragic actress. Without her lengthy career in boulevard theater, vaudeville, and film, however, we would have no basis for remembering her at all. "Lessons from the Diva" aims to restore the fullness of an extraordinary life and career to a late twentieth-century audience bombarded by mass culture. Professor Ockman analyzes photographs, posters, oil paintings, caricatures, and costumes to demonstrate that Bernhardt is a key figure for understanding popular icons, including Fanny Brice and Sandra Bernhard, Mae West and Madonna.
