The Art of Execution

Pictures and Punishment in Western Culture: The Aesthetic Image of Public Execution and its Impact on Criminal Justice

Tuesday, March 28 at 7:00 PM

Capital punishment (whether known as governmental killing, judicial homicide, or martyrdom, and previously performed by beheading, hanging, burning, the wheel, etc.) has moved behind prison walls, and its depictions have become rare. At times a demented form of theatre, capital punishment was also a subject for the visual arts. This program will explore the impact of artistic depictions of the bloody history of capital punishment and will analyze how each emerging civilization has attempted to control and institutionalize the desire for revenge.

Samuel Y. Edgerton, Amos Lawrence Professor of Art History at Williams College and author of *Pictures and Punishment: Art and Criminal Prosecution During the Florentine Renaissance*, will be among the participants of this event. The panel is composed of Professor Edgerton; moderator Norman L. Greene of Schoeman, Updike & Kaufman, NYC; speaker Craig Brandon, Director of Student Media at The College of Journalism, Keene State College, New Hampshire, and author of *The Electric Chair: An Unnatural American History*; and speaker Barbara Jaffe, Attorney, New York State Supreme Court. The program is sponsored by the Committee on Capital Punishment at the Association of the Bar of the City of New York, Norman L. Greene, Esq., Chair; Committee on Civil Rights, Ronald Tabak, Esq., Chair; Committee on Criminal Law, Charles Adler, Esq., Chair; and The Law and Humanities Institute.

This year's Faculty Forum is entitled, "The Next Century," an interdisciplinary theme challenging us to focus on the next 100 years and its prospects for a global humanity. A collection of premiere Williams faculty members has brought together a set of lectures that offer different ways of thinking about our world and the questions facing us in the century ahead. There is ample representation from such fields pertinent to this inquiry as astronomy, biochemistry, economics and politics, so we hope that you'll join us for this year's Faculty Forum. It's a spectacular opportunity to meet, think, and discuss important issues with other Williams alumni/ae and some of Williams' top professors.

Charles M. Lovett, Jr., Professor of Chemistry

"Beyond the Human Genome Project"

With the completion of the human genome project in 2003, the entire set of genetic instructions that shape a human being will be known. The likely ramifications of this unprecedented amount of data are astounding—we will probably witness revolutionary advances in medicine and biotechnology, widespread genetic discrimination, reconstruction of the history of life on earth, and possibly the synthesis of life, itself. Professor Lovett will discuss how our impending knowledge of the complete genetic code for a human being could impact life in the 21st century.

Cheryl Shanks, Assistant Professor of Political Science

"Globalization and the Future of the State"

Is the state an anachronism in the age of globalization? The earliest nation-states grew up around common markets, which were limited territorially by the communications and transportation technologies of the day. States are still territorial, but communications technologies and markets are now global. Professor Shanks will consider how well the state continues to perform key functions, comparing it with the alternatives of market governance, on the one hand, and a world government, on the other.

Jay M. Pasachoff, Professor of Astronomy

"Astronomy and Space Exploration in the Next Century"

The end of the 1900s has brought not only the fabulous views of space from the Hubble Space Telescope but also, for the last few months, equivalent x-ray images from the Chandra X-ray Observatory. Though NASA's space exploration of the planets ended badly, with the loss of two Mars spacecraft, its record over the last few decades included visits to all the planets except for Pluto. Further, a new generation of 320-inch and 400-inch telescopes on Earthbound mountaintops has enabled astronomers to study distant objects in more detail. Black holes are being found all over, from stars in our galaxy to a black hole a million times the mass of our Sun in the center of our galaxy to even more massive ones in distant galaxies and quasars. I will assess the discoveries recently made and those likely to be made in the next century.

M 2000: THE NEXT CENTURY

Catharine B. Hill, Professor of Economics

“The Economics of Zambia and of Williams College at the Start of the 21st Century”

Fiscal policy in developing countries and budgets in institutions of higher education play an important role in achieving the objectives of decision makers. After three years as an advisor to the Government of the Republic of Zambia and almost a year in the Provost's Office at Williams, the unexpected similarities between the budget issues facing these two institutions are almost as striking as the anticipated differences. Professor Hill's talk will focus on several of these unlikely similarities, and their importance to policymakers as we move into the next century. The talk will focus in on the economics of higher education, and Williams College in particular, taking lessons from the large body of knowledge about the role of fiscal policy in developing countries.

ABOUT THE SPEAKERS

Charles M. Lovett, Jr. The Philip and Dorothy Schein Professor of Chemistry, Charles (Chip) Lovett, received his B.S. and M.S. degrees in chemistry from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona and his Ph.D. in biochemistry from Cornell University. Since coming to Williams in 1985, Professor Lovett has served as Chair of the Biochemistry and Molecular Biology Program, Chair of the Chemistry Department, and Chair of the Global Studies Program. For the past seven years, he has been Director of the interdisciplinary Bronfman Science Center and Chair of the Science Executive Committee; during this time he has overseen the design and construction of the College's new \$48 million science facility. Professor Lovett's research on DNA repair has been supported by grants from the National Science Foundation for the past ten years. His research involves undergraduate students extensively and has resulted in numerous publications with Williams students as coauthors. He is also Director of the Summer Science Program for Minority Students. This is Professor Lovett's third Faculty Forum.

Cheryl Shanks. Cheryl Shanks received her B.A. from the University of California at Santa Cruz in 1983, and her M.A. from the University of Michigan in 1988. Just tenured, she joined the Williams faculty in 1994, after she earned her Ph.D. from the University of Michigan and won an Institute for the Study of World Politics Fellowship in 1992-93. At Williams, Professor Shanks teaches courses in the fields of international relations theory and international organizations, such as Cultural Imperialism, Ethics and Interests in Foreign Policy, Immigration and Citizenship in a Global Context, and Governing the World: Treaties, Laws, and Institutions. Her classes generally look at the way that anarchy - the lack of a world government - shapes the way that these problems are framed and conflicts get resolved. Professor Shanks is particularly interested in the consequences of anarchy for achieving human values: justice, equality, security, freedom. She is involved in many aspects of Williams life, serving on the Faculty Steering Committee and as Special Advisor for Public and International Affairs Schools and Foreign Service for students. She has also delivered acclaimed lectures as a participant in the Gaudino Series, "Justice or Stability in Post-Pol Pot Cambodia?" and for the Alumni Relations Weekend Faculty Lectures, "Dilemmas of Refugee Assistance." Professor Shanks is the author of *Immigration and the Politics of American Sovereignty* and of articles on global political change.

Jay M. Pasachoff. Astronomer Jay Pasachoff graduated from Harvard College in 1963 and earned both his A.M. and Ph.D. from Harvard University in 1965 and 1969, respectively, before starting at Williams in 1972. He serves as the Field Memorial Professor of Astronomy at Williams, as well as Chair of the Astronomy Department and Director of the Hopkins Observatory, the oldest observatory in the United States. Professor Pasachoff is one of the most renowned scholars in the field of astronomy and is frequently cited in the news, including *The New York Times*, *Science Magazine*, NPR's "Morning Edition," The Discovery Channel and ABC News.com. He holds a number of prestigious domestic and international committee appointments and is author of many articles and books, notably *A Field Guide to the Stars and Planets* and *Astronomy: From the Earth to the Universe*, the foremost educational text on astronomy, with an interactive CD-ROM planetarium program, RedShift. Recently, Professor Pasachoff studied the August 11, 1999, total solar eclipse in Romania with a team of students, colleagues, and Williams alumni with support from the National Science Foundation, the National Geographic Society, and NASA.

Catharine B. Hill '76. Catharine (Cappy) Hill graduated from Williams *summa cum laude* in 1976 and earned a second B.A. with First Class Honours from Oxford University in 1978. In 1985, she earned her Ph.D. in Economics from Yale University, the same year that she started at Williams as an assistant professor of Economics. Professor Hill served as Chair of the Center for Development Economics from 1992-1994 and as Chair of the Economics Department from 1997-1999. She assumed the position of Provost on July 1, 1999 and brings extensive international experience to the role including work at the Economic Development Institute, The World Bank, and the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Congressional Budget Office. From 1994-1997 she was the fiscal trade advisor and then chief-of-party of the Harvard Institute for International Development Advisor Project on Macroeconomic Reform in the Ministry of Finance in Zambia. Professor Hill has won numerous grants recognizing her work and was an Arthur Okun Research Fellow at The Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C from 1984-1985. She is the co-editor of *Public Expenditure in Africa* and has published articles in a number of scholarly publications, including *World Development*. Professor Hill is the first alumna to receive

The tour concludes among the edifices of Istanbul, amazing structures that house treasures of the Byzantine and Ottoman Empires.
