MET Lectures

Walker Evans: Films of His Time

Saturday, April 15th at 1:00 PM

The Metropolitan Museum of Art (Fifth Ave. at 82nd St.)

Walker Evans and his close friend and collaborator, James Agee, were avid film fans who also worked as film critics, Agee for The Nation and Evans at Time Magazine. In 1941, they published Let Us Now Praise Famous Men, with text by Agee and photographs of destitute tenant farmers by Evans, a book on Alabama sharecroppers that many now see as a literary and artistic gem of the 1930s. His photographed film posters, from this and from his other works, are vernacular images that were part of his study of the changing shape of the American scene. There will be three screenings as part of the program: Modern Times (1936) at 1 PM, The Emperor Jones (1933) at 4 PM, and Grand Hotel (1932) at 7 PM.



The Met's exhibition, "Walker Evans," includes the familiar Depression images as well as the photos he took of African-American churches in South Carolina and his series on New York subway riders. The lecture at 2:30 PM is narrated by Jeff L. Rosenheim, Assistant Curator for the Department of Photographs at the Met, who has curated this retrospective and worked on the Walker Evans Archive for the last five years. He explains, "Evans' eye was always drawn to things that told simple truth." The exhibit is not limited to photographs as some of the many postcards Evans collected will be among the objects on display. Another thread that runs throughout the show is Evans' burning desire to be a writer. He pursued this in Paris in 1926 but returned to New York one year later to take up photography more seriously than writing. Walker Evans did spend some time in college life, however, at Williams College with the Class of 1926.

the Founders, the poets of democracy and the transcontinental trekkers to examine the roots of the American character and trait which they have been most famous for: their idealism and optimism, in good times and tragic times. The result is a highly topical and timely work, throwing new light on the Clinton era, the moral issues of the 2000 Presidential campaigns and on the condition of American society today.

Mr. Jeffcoat turned to full-time writing in the Northwest after a career as foreign correspondent, corporate executive and communications counselor. He became a foreign correspondent for *The Wall Street Journal* while in his twenties, based in London and then as bureau chief in Paris, writing front-page feature articles and editorial page features on European political and social issues. When he returned to America, Mr. Jeffcoat continued his writing for the *Journal* on politics, foreign affairs, business and labor. He also wrote articles on a variety of subjects published in such prestigious publications as *Harvard Business Review*, *Reader's Digest*, *The Christian Science Monitor* and *Nation's Business*. Before turning to independent writing, he held executive positions at Ford Motor Company and IBM, and was president of his own firm, Jeffcoat, Schoen & Morrell, counseling major corporations and nonprofit organizations including the New York City Bar Association, the Carnegie Corporation and its commissions, the Council on Foreign Relations, the Japan Society and his alma mater, Williams College. In extra-curricular affairs, he is honorary founder and chairman of a nonprofit performing arts organization, The Manhattan Theatre Club, internationally recognized as a leading center for the development of new work in theatre, as well as producer of a Pulitzer Prize-drama and other productions on Broadway and in motion pictures. Mr. Jeffcoat graduated from Williams in 1946 with a degree in American History and Literature and received his graduate degree from the University of Michigan. He spent six years researching and writing *Spirited Americans*, and he is presently at work on a new book that develops the most important themes of that book in a philosophical orientation.

Esteemed Williams Professor Emeritus, James MacGregor Burns has hailed *Spirited Americans* as, "A grand literary and historical achievement as we enter the new century." Signed copies of this self-published book, rife with references to Williams College, will be available for purchase to all who attend this informative event.

FIFTH ANNUAL FACULTY FORUM

2000: THE NEXT CENTURY - APRIL 1,

This year's Faculty Forum is entitled, "The Next Century," an interdisciplinary theme challenging us to focus on the next 100 years and its prospects for a global humanity. A collection of premiere Williams faculty members has brought together a set of lectures that offer different ways of thinking about our world and the questions facing us in the century ahead. There is ample representation from such fields pertinent to this inquiry as astronomy, biochemistry, economics and politics, so we hope that you'll join us for this year's Faculty Forum. It's a spectacular opportunity to meet, think, and discuss important issues with other Williams alumni/ae and some of Williams' top professors.

Charles M. Lovett, Jr., Professor of Chemistry - "Beyond the Human Genome Project"

With the completion of the human genome project in 2003, the entire set of genetic instructions that shape a human being will be known. The likely ramifications of this unprecedented amount of data are astounding--we will probably witness revolutionary advances in medicine and biotechnology, widespread genetic discrimination, reconstruction of the history of life on earth, and possibly the synthesis of life, itself. Professor Lovett will discuss how our impending knowledge of the complete genetic code for a human being could impact life in the 21st century.

Cheryl Shanks, Assistant Professor of Political Science - "Globalization and the Future of the State"

Is the state an anachronism in the age of globalization? The earliest nation-states grew up around common markets, which were limited territorially by the communications and transportation technologies of the day. States are still territorial, but communications technologies and markets are now global. Professor Shanks will consider how well the state continues to perform key functions, comparing it with the alternatives of market governance, on the one hand, and a world government, on the other.

Jay M. Pasachoff, Professor of Astronomy - "Astronomy and Space Exploration in the Next Century"

The end of the 1900s has brought not only the fabulous views of space from the Hubble Space Telescope but also, for the last few months, equivalent x-ray images from the Chandra X-ray Observatory. Though NASA's space exploration of the planets ended badly, with the loss of two Mars spacecraft, its record over the last few decades included visits to all the planets except for Pluto. Further, a new generation of 320-inch and 400-inch telescopes on Earthbound mountaintops has enabled astronomers to study distant objects in more detail. Black holes are being found all over, from stars in our galaxy to a black hole a million times the mass of our Sun in the center of our galaxy to even more massive ones in distant galaxies and quasars. Professor Pasachoff will assess the discoveries recently made and those likely to be made in the next century.

Catharine B. Hill, Professor of Economics -

"The Economics of Zambia and of Williams College at the Start of the 21st Century"

Fiscal policy in developing countries and budgets in institutions of higher education play an important role in achieving the objectives of decision makers. After three years as an advisor to the Government of the Republic of Zambia and almost a year in the Provost's Office at Williams, the unexpected similarities between the budget issues facing these two institutions are almost as striking as the anticipated differences. Professor Hill's talk will focus on several of these unlikely similarities, and their importance to policymakers as we move into the next century. Hill will examine the economics of higher education, and Williams College in particular, taking lessons from the large body of knowledge about the role of fiscal policy in developing countries.

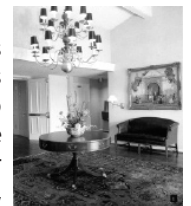
