Why did crime in New York drop so suddenly in 1990s? How does an unknown novelist end up a best-selling author? Why is teenage smoking out of control when it seems as if everyone knows smoking kills? Why did Paul Revere succeed with his famous warning?

In his groundbreaking book, New Yorker writer Malcolm Gladwell looks at why major changes in our society so often happen suddenly and unexpectedly. Ideas, behavior, messages, and products, he argues, often spread like outbreaks of infectious disease. Just as a single sick person can start an epidemic of the flu, so too can a few fare-beaters and graffiti artists fuel a subway crime wave, or a satisfied customer fill the empty tables of a new restaurant. These are social epidemics, and the moment when they suddenly take off is called the "tipping point."

Based on his essays for The New Yorker, The Tipping Point scours all facets of society in search of clues about what makes an idea infectious -- in history or in a high-tech company.

The Commander is a rare design link between the heavily built-for-steam boats of the late nineteenth century and the more lightly built vessels of the twentieth century. It has the distinction of being the last operating vessel that served in the U.S. Navy in World War I, and joins the battleship Texas and the battle cruiser Olympic, as the only remaining ships from that era. She displays the World War I, Victory Medal as a token of her service. Listed in 1984 on both the State and National Registers of Historic Places, the Commander is also listed in the International Register of Historic Ships, Great American Ships, and the Dictionary of American Fighting Ships.

The brunch menu will feature quiche, baked ham, sausage, blueberry crepes, home fries, fresh fruit, bagels with smoked salmon, rolls, muffins and croissants. In addition to coffee service and an assortment of juices, a full bar with beer, wine, and bloody marys will be offered as well. The enclosed lower deck, furnished with tables, chairs, and benches, has spacious picture windows allowing for pleasurable viewing of the passing scenery. The upper deck has ample seating and is partly covered by a canopy, affording both sun and shade for those enjoying the magnificent view of the Hudson Highlands.
