Assistant Professor and Coordinator of Dance at Williams College, Sandra Burton is a choreographer, dancer, educator, and arts presenter. She has served on the Arts Curriculum Framework Committee for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Education, currently consults and serves as a panelist for the National Endowment for the Arts, and is on the Board of Directors for both the New England Foundation for the Arts and the Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival.

She was a member of the Chuck Davis Company for twelve years and her choreography has been performed both nationally and internationally. Her dance education includes study with Thelma Hill, Daniel Nagrin, Betty Jones, and Martha Wittman (modern dance), Walter Raines and Karel Shook (ballet), Chuck Davis, Italo Zambo, and Obo Addy (African dance). She has lectured on African dance styles, jazz tap, and Hip Hop for Boston's Dance umbrella, Jacob's Pillow, and the Flynn Theatre. Ms. Burton has received numerous research, travel, and presenting grants and was a Massachusetts Cultural Council finalist for excellence in choreography.

DINO DELVAILLE '92. As the Vice President of Artist and Repertoire for Universal Records, Dino has enforced "never rest on your laurels" and has established himself to be one of the most dynamic and versatile men of the music industry. After graduating from Williams--where he was a Hip Hop DJ for WCFM and a regular DJ at campus parties--with a degree in African American Studies, Dino was positive that he wanted to pursue a career in music and found himself interning at Columbia Records. During the internship Dino started a street team which helped promote various artists projects including Redman's first album "What?... The Album." Dino was then picked up by Empire Management/Payday Records where he worked his way into a position in A&R, signing Jeru (The Damaja), WC (Westside Connection), Mos Def and Jay Z.

In 1996 Dino was approached to work on a new start-up label that would be Universal Records. He signed Crucial Conflict who were the first of the Midwest hip-hop invasion and the Lost Boyz who both produced gold albums. He also worked on Rakim's return album "The Eighteenth Letter" and was rewarded with a platinum album along with Rakim's triumphant comeback. Later he discovered the group known as Cash Money (Baby, Juvenile, Slim, Lil' Wayne & BG) who have sold over 40 million records and have made phrases like "Bling, Bling" commonplace. His current projects include working with Pastor Troy, Baby of Cash Money, and the XXX Soundtrack. In his perfect world, he would "run a major record company or own a production company."

DR. KYRA D. GAUNT. Ethnomusicologist Kyra D. Gaunt recently joined the Department of Music at NYU as an Associate Professor. Her specialties are contemporary African American popular music and identity (or the politics of race, gender and musical embodiment); the gender and musical politics surrounding jazz singers, and popular culture as a product of the people (rather than mass media). NYU Press will be publishing her forthcoming book *The Games Black Girls Play: Learning the Ropes from Double Dutch to Hip-Hop* in 2003.

### "Secrets and Lies: Politics and Political Science in the Clinton & Bush Era"

#### An Evening with Austin Sarat

Austin Sarat is the William Nelson Cromwell Professor of Jurisprudence & Political Science at Amherst College. He is a past President of the Law & Society Association and current President of the Association for the Study of Law, Culture, and the Humanities. He is the author of more than one hundred scholarly articles and the author or editor of more than thirty books, including Law & Violence, The Killing State, Pain, Death, and the Law, Divorce Lawyers and Their Clients, and When the State Kills: Capital Punishment and the American Condition. His public writing has appeared on the op-ed pages of The Los Angeles Times and American Prospect. In 1997 he received The Harry Kalven Award given by the Law & Society Association for "distinguished research on law and society." At Amherst, he was a co-founder of the College's newest academic department, Law, Jurisprudence, & Social Thought and is chair of the Colloquium on the Constitution and the Imagining of America. He has appeared on The O'Reilly Factor and provided commentary on National Public Radio's The Connection, on MSNBC News, and Fox News among others. His teaching has been featured in The New York Times, The Boston Globe, on National Public Radio, and on The Today Show.

A recipient of a Ford Foundation Postdoctoral Fellowship and a National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship, Dr. Gaunt's publications appear in *Generations of Youth* (1998), *Language, Rhythm and Sound* (1997), and *Feminism, Multiculturalism and the Media* (1995). One of her most recent publications is devoted to her teaching experiences and musical interactions (esp. dancing) with her students in a hip-hop course taught at the University of Virginia for three years. Currently, Dr. Gaunt is a consultant for PBS's "Zoom" and "Between the Lions" produced by WGBH. In addition, she performs as a jazz, R&B, and classically-trained vocalist in Washington Square Park, jam sessions, and gigs throughout New York City.

**KENARD GIBBS '86.** A gifted speaker, Kenard Gibbs is frequently called upon to speak on issues regarding the urban marketplace, and is available to provide commentary on all facets of urban business, and the business of entertainment and publishing. Gibbs holds a Masters degree in Marketing and Finance from Northwestern University's Kellogg Graduate School of Management and a BA in Political Economy from Williams College. As president of Vibe Magazine, Gibbs is instrumental in the strategic positioning and growth of the company's management, as well as overseeing the advertising, event marketing, and public relations departments.

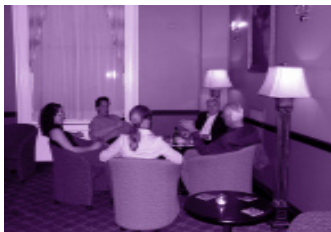

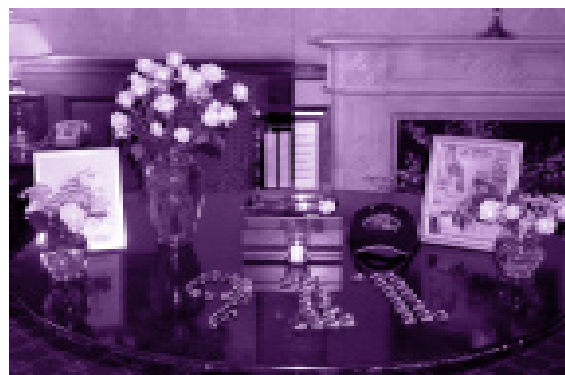
