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President's Report on Results of Williams Club Survey

The Board of Governors of the Williams Club in New York initiated a strategic planning process to address current and long range needs and objectives. A survey of members has been completed as an aid to this process. Surveys of Williams Alumni and Club members and affiliates have been conducted in the past. One was completed to assist planning when the Club underwent a considerable refurbishment over 15 years ago. Another survey, sponsored by The Williams College Society of Alumni, was completed about eight years ago to support a presentation to the College Board of Trustees on the viability of the Club. These surveys provide a basis for comparison of usage of and attitudes toward the Club.

The Survey Method

Goldstein/Krall Associates conducted the survey among Williams alumni/alumnae Club members and affiliate members by mail, as well as on-campus interviews with representatives of Williams College administration, alumni relations and faculty. At the end of December 2003, a total of 825 questionnaires were mailed to all alumni/alumnae Williams Club members in the New York metropolitan area, New York State, New England States, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. 251 completed questionnaires were received back, a yield of 31 percent. Similarly, just after the first of 2004, 704 questionnaires were mailed to affiliate members of the Club in the same geographic area. 193 completed questionnaires were received back, a yield of 28 percent.

A total of 15 interviews were conducted with administration, alumni and faculty people. Fourteen of these interviews were completed on campus and one was completed by telephone in New York City. Respondents included the College President, Provost, Dean, Vice President of Finance, Director of Admissions, Director of Career Placement and the faculty persons involved with the Williams in New York pilot program among others.

Survey Results

Major findings were as follows:

- Affiliates are valuable members.
- Lodging and convenience are the main reasons for joining and are the major Club benefits. Congenial dining atmosphere and maintaining Williams relationship to alumni are additional benefits. The latter is seen as important in several questions.
- Bedrooms/accommodations and bathrooms are not rated too well. Comments support that they should be spruced up. Overall appearance is down since the '96 survey.
- Quality of staff was praised.
- Reciprocal use of other Clubs is another important advantage.
- Business and social Club uses are high for alumni, but they aren't mentioned as frequently by affiliates.
- Club activities with highest interest levels were cultural and dinner meetings particularly for Williams-related events (reunions, profs) for alumni.
- Sizeable numbers rate Club pricing as reasonable. Periodic cost increases would not especially bother two-thirds of alumni members and affiliates.
- Room-related mentions and room availability are major areas for improvement. More meeting/private space would be helpful.

Club use

Overnight stays represent the most important reason for visiting the Club in the past 12 months, especially for affiliates. The latter also stand out for meals and cocktails. Current alumni mention overnight stays and lunches more than 1996 alumni, while those in the earlier survey were more apt to cite dinner, cocktails, business functions, college events, class functions and telethons.

Reasons for joining Club

Overnight accommodations is a prime reason both alumni and affiliates cite for joining the Club, particularly affiliates. Three out of ten alumni mention a desire to maintain a Williams relationship. Convenience, meals and business gatherings were mentioned by 20% to 26% of affiliates, all to a greater extent than alumni. It may be that alumni citing the maintenance of Williams relationships are inferring that they would have meals, drinks and gatherings with other Williams people, and that's why these reasons are lower for alumni than for affiliates.

Ratings

Rating by Alumni of overall Club appearance has dropped considerably since 1996. Furnishings and décor have also dropped. Conversely, alumni ratings of food, dining room service, Club personnel, location and availability of accommodations have all improved considerably over the past eight years.

Areas for improvement

Two-thirds of alumni mention better room availability and room mentions in general as ways in which the Club might serve members better. More private space was cited by just over 50%, bathroom-related mentions by 40%. These are the major suggestions. Affiliates were much less apt to answer this question than alumni, although better room availability would be important to over half of the affiliates. To a greater extent than alumni (but at a relatively low level), affiliates brought up drop-in office space and food.

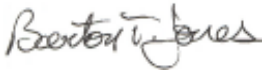
View from Williams College

Two major points about the Williams Club emerged from the campus interviews:

- 1 - The Club represents a «home away from home (Williams)» in New York. This point is also emphasized by the findings from the survey of Club Members.
- 2 - The Club represents the opportunity for extending the learning or education experience of the College, also suggested by the findings of the member survey.

Next Steps

The Board of Governors will incorporate the findings of this survey in the Club's strategic plan. The plan is currently being developed in areas of facilities, program and membership. The Board will be holding a weekend meeting at the beginning of May in Williamstown and expects to approve a final plan then. It will be shared with all members at the next annual meeting in June.

Through the Eyes of a Philosopher and a Journalist

Several years ago, New York Times' Magazine writer James Traub sat in on a class of one of

Williams College's most provocative professors, Mark Taylor, who on paper is a religion scholar but who is, as his students and other fans can attest, just as much an original philosopher of modern day society and cultural. Of Egyptian and Texan parentage, Hazem Gamal was born and grew up primarily in Cairo, a citizen of two worlds. With a degree in international hotel and travel management, he's helped advise managers and run hotels and food venues from Boston to Hong Kong and Geneva to. An MBA from Thunderbird, The Garvin School of International Management redirected his career into the domain of finance through American Express and now as a vice president with OppenheimerFunds in New York.

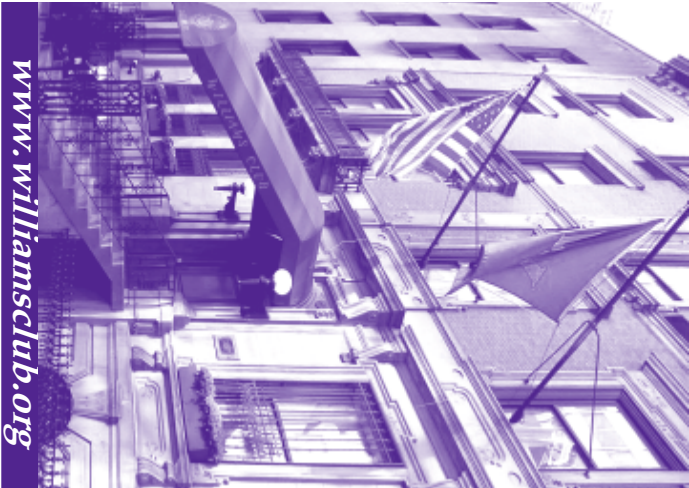
