Political Dynasties with Congressman Mark Udall '72 (5/15)



America has seen the Roosevelts, the Kennedys and most recently the Bush dynasty. Few in politics today have better insight into this feature of our civic landscape than U.S. Rep. Mark Udall (D-Colorado). His father, Morris "Mo" Udall, served in the U.S. House of Representatives for 30 years and ran for the Democratic nomination for President in 1976. His uncle, Stewart, was one of the pioneers of the environmental movement while serving as Secretary of the Interior under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson.

Mark Udall is serving his fourth term representing Colorado's Second Congressional District, and has already announced his candidacy for the U.S. Senate in 2008. Though he spent a decade as executive director of the Colorado Outward Bound School and is considered an expert on environmental issues, Udall is a member of the House Armed Services Committee and the House Science Committee as well as the House Resources Committee. He is the ranking member of the Committee on Science Space and Aeronautics Subcommittee, the co-chair of the House Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency Caucus - and the lowest handicap golfer in either the House or Senate.

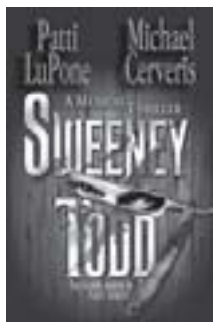

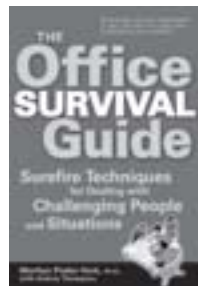

Annual Dinner with MA District Attorney Martha Coakley '75 (6/15)

“High profile cases, the 6th Amendment, the Purple Cow, and the Hokey Pokey: What’s their relevance in a Flat World?”

The Annual Meeting and Dinner is the gala celebration of The Williams Club’s yearly calendar. The dinner will feature a presentation by Middlesex District Attorney **Martha Coakley '75** and a state of The Club update from President Barton Jones '68. The President’s Cup trophy will be awarded to the Williams College class with the largest number of attendees at the dinner.

Middlesex District Attorney Martha Coakley is a seasoned prosecutor who has committed much of her legal career to public safety in Middlesex. Since assuming office as District Attorney in January 1999, Martha Coakley has dedicated her time and energy to bringing justice to crime victims and their families, as well as to working with law enforcement and community leaders in a variety of diverse and multi-faceted prevention efforts and to improve public safety. She first joined the Middlesex District Attorney’s Office in 1986, as an Assistant District Attorney in the Lowell District Court office. In 1987, Coakley was invited by the U.S. Justice Department to join its Boston Organized Crime Strike Force as a Special Attorney. She returned to the District Attorney’s Office in 1989, and in 1991 was appointed the Chief of the Child Abuse Prosecution Unit. During her tenure as Chief, District Attorney Coakley investigated and prosecuted hundreds of cases, including *Commonwealth v. Louise Woodward*. In December 1997, Coakley resigned her position to campaign for District Attorney in the 54 cities and towns of Middlesex.



During her term as District Attorney, Martha Coakley has earned the respect of the law enforcement, legal, and medical communities. She has been recognized by Mothers Against Drunk Driving, the Massachusetts School of Law, and the Frank J. Murray Inn of Court. In November 2000, the Women’s Bar Association of Massachusetts honored Coakley with its coveted Leila J. Robinson Award for her contributions to the field of law. In June 2002, the YWCA Boston selected District Attorney Coakley as a member of its Academy of Women Achievers Class of 2002. In January 2004, District Attorney Coakley received the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce’s Pinnacle Award for Excellence in Management in Government. District Attorney Coakley has served as a guest speaker and panel participant addressing concerns relative to child abuse, domestic violence, and criminal justice for various groups, including the Massachusetts Medical Society, the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, the Boston Bar Association, the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce, and the American Academy of Pediatrics.

In January 2002, District Attorney Coakley completed a one-year term as the President of the Massachusetts District Attorney’s Association. In addition, she is a former president of the Women’s Bar Association of Massachusetts, and has served on the Board of Directors at the Dana Farber Cancer Institute. As Middlesex District Attorney, she serves as the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Middlesex Partnerships for Youth, Inc., a non-profit organization committed to providing prevention and intervention resources and training to Middlesex school districts and communities. With Middlesex Partnerships for Youth, District Attorney Coakley has hosted numerous workshops and training seminars for law enforcement, social service providers, and educators, to help foster an atmosphere of respect and public safety for Middlesex youth. In addition, District Attorney Coakley’s office has produced several award-winning educational videos, on such topics as drinking and driving, internet safety, designer drugs, and youth sports violence. District Attorney Coakley has been a frequent lecturer at Boston University, Boston College Law School, Tufts University, as well as at elementary and high schools in several communities. In January 2002 and 2003, she co-taught a winter study, “Law and Social Policy,” at her alma mater, Williams College. During the Fall 2003 semester, District Attorney Coakley taught “Advanced Criminal Trial Advocacy” at the Massachusetts School of Law in Andover, MA.

Martha Coakley received a B.A. degree, cum laude, from Williams College in 1975, and a J.D. degree from the Boston University School of Law in 1979. She began her career as an associate at the law firm of Parker, Coulter, Daley & White, and later practiced at Goodwin Procter, both in Boston. Coakley resides in Medford, Massachusetts, with her husband, Thomas F. O’Connor, Jr.

Feeding Desire Tour with Darra Goldstein (6/21)



Join Professor of Russian and guest curator Darra Goldstein for a private tour of her “Feeding Desire: Design and the Tools of the Table, 1500-2005” exhibition at the Smithsonian’s Cooper-Hewitt, National Design Museum. After the tour, plan on returning to The Williams Club for more conversation and a special dining experience with Darra at the sumptuous summer BBQ that night!

“Feeding Desire” is a rich, contextual journey through the evolution of dining from 1500 to 2005. More than 300 objects, including historic and modern flatware from the museum’s permanent collection, are featured in the one-floor exhibition, on view from May 5 through Oct. 29, 2006. It offers a scholarly yet celebratory overview of the history of culinary culture, exploring the physical forms and social meanings of eating utensils and serving tools.

The exhibition begins in what was once the Carnegie’s dining room, with a table set and lavishly adorned with flatware and serving accoutrements in the style of the Gilded Age. In this room, the major “players” that dominate the modern Western table setting will be introduced: the knife, fork and spoon. “Feeding Desire” will examine, through objects and graphic displays, the distinct origin and design progression of each utensil during the last five centuries, tracing variations in social customs, cuisines and decorative fashion in the United States and Europe. Extraordinary examples of historic cutlery will be on view, including a Northern Italian set with mother-of-pearl handles from 1590 and a mid-18th century, steel-and-silver, pistol-gripped fork owned by George Washington.

One of the highlights of “Feeding Desire” is the collection of specialized and unusual serving tools included in the exhibition. Among the objects on view are a NASA meal kit, a silver-gilt macaroni server from 1860, ice cream hatchets and saws, asparagus tongs and a scallop fork. Though many of these tools have become obsolete, they provide a fascinating glimpse into culinary design ingenuity. An exhibition catalog is available that includes an essay by Darra Goldstein and over 200 color illustrations.



Darra Goldstein is Professor of Russian at Williams College and Founding Editor of *Gastronomica: The Journal of Food and Culture*. Since earning her Ph.D. in Slavic Languages & Literatures from Stanford University, she has published numerous books and articles on Russian literature, culture, art, and cuisine. She is also the author of three cookbooks, including *The Georgian Feast*, which won the 1994 IACP Julia Child Award for Cookbook of the Year. Goldstein has consulted for the Russian Tea Room and Firebird restaurants in New York and is currently Food Editor of *Russian Life* magazine.

Jay Pasachoff of Williams and Jeff Hoffman & Larry Young of Amherst / M.I.T. discuss the future of space exploration.
